the CASTLE

There have been Campbell castles on the shores of Loch Fyne since the 1400s, although the present Inveraray Castle was built in the late 18th century. Inspired by Vanbrugh, the architect of Blenheim Palace and Castle Howard, its baroque, Palladian and gothic style was architecturally before its time. After a fire in 1877, a third floor was added, along with conical roofs on the corner turrets – creating the 'fairytale' castle we see today.



the CLAN CAMPBELL

Inveraray Castle is the ancestral home of the Dukes of Argyll and the seat of Clan Campbell. The Campbells arrived in Argyll as part of a royal expedition c.1220 and settled in nearby Loch Awe, where their Chief, Colin Mor Campbell ('Colin the Great') was placed in charge of the King's lands in the area. His name, 'MacCailean Mor', is still used by the Chief of Clan Campbell.

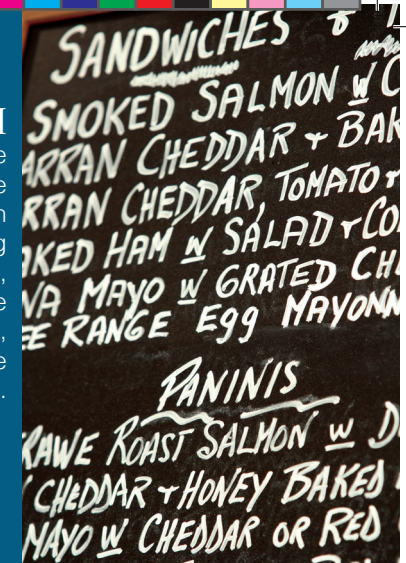
the GARDENS

The Castle gardens and grounds extend to 16 acres, including two acres of formal lawns and flowerbeds, as well as 180 hectares of park and woodland, one of the most important designed landscapes in Scotland. Famous for its rhododendrons and azaleas in early summer, the garden has a riot of daffodils and bluebells in the spring and a tapestry of colours in the summer and autumn.



the TEAROOM

Run by the Duchess, the Castle Tearoom offers the best in local and Scottish ingredients, including Inverawe smoked salmon, Mull cheddar and Arran ice creams. Soups, quiches, cakes and scones are made daily in the Castle.



the GIFT SHOP

The Castle Gift Shop is managed by the Duchess and has a vast array of gifts, books and souvenirs relating to the castle and Clan Campbell. Many items are designed exclusively for the shop and using local craftspeople.
